




Orientation - addresses the history of freshwater pearls of the world; the history of the only freshwater pearl-culturing operation in the North American continent's founder - John Latendresse Southern-Style Catered (1925-2000); an overview of the pearlculturing process explains incidents participants will see throughout the tour.

Visit with a local diver - a local diver emerges from beneath the water in full wet suit hoisting his "catch of the day" onto the docks. Participants see the grilled chicken, potato salad, different

Staff Photographers make photos throughout the day so that tourists may recap their visit on the website a couple of days later.




